(a) Disclosable Pecuniary Interests (DPI) under the Localism Act 2011. The nature as well as the existence of any such interest must be declared. After declaring a DPI, the Member must leave the meeting and not take part in the discussion or vote. This applies even if there is provision for public speaking.

(b) Disclosable Non-Pecuniary Interests (DNPI) under the Code of Conduct adopted by the Council in May 2012. The nature as well as the existence of any such interest must be declared. After declaring a DNPI interest, the Member may stay, speak and vote on the matter.

(c) Where it is possible that a fair-minded and informed observer, having considered the facts would conclude that there was a real possibility that

the Member might be predetermined or biased the Member should declare their predetermination or bias and then leave the meeting while that item is considered.

Advice to Members: If any Councillor has any doubt about the existence or nature of any DPI or DNPI which he/she may have in any item on this agenda, he/she should seek advice from the Monitoring Officer, the Head of Legal or from other Solicitors in Legal Services as early as possible, and in advance of the meeting.

4.	Engagement with the Police	<p>Invitations had been extended to the Police and Crime Commissioner and the District Commander for Swale to attend a Sittingbourne Area Committee meeting. These had been declined as the Police said there were other forums that they regularly attended where the Committee's concerns could be raised.</p> <p>The Chair advised that as the Sittingbourne area was unparished, it was not possible to attend any of those forums. A request for a Sittingbourne Area Committee Member to sit on Swale Kent Association of Local Councils would be submitted.</p> <p>The Head of Housing & Community Services advised that the Police were carrying out a Neighbourhood Policing Review which would cover engagement and this issue would be raised as part of Swale Borough Council's (SBC) consultation response.</p>	<p>The Head of Housing and Community Services advised a questionnaire was circulated to all Members to capture issues and feedback on the neighbourhood policing review. 7.	Bus services	<p>At the December 2021 meeting a member of the public commented on bus services, in particular route 347 only having one bus instead of two. Residents were not able to use the new facilities in Sittingbourne without a reliable bus service. Stagecoach had said they would not come to Sittingbourne without a depot. The Head of Housing & Community Services said that a meeting was due to take place with KCC, SBC and the bus operators and she would raise this matter at the meeting.</p> <p>The Quality Bus Partnership isn't currently meeting. The Council did submit a response to the bus consultation, raising concerns about the reduction of bus services in the Swale area.</p> <p>The Divisional Member for Sittingbourne North commented KCC do not control bus companies so do not "close" routes or services. Sittingbourne High Street Conservation Area Review

The Conservation Area appraisal document has now been finalised that includes changes made as a result of the public consultation and agreement for adoption by the cabinet.

The document will be published on the Swale Borough Council website by mid-September and will be subject to 21-day notification period prior to formal adoption for development management purposes.

Local Heritage List – process for making nominations

The final adopted listing criteria for Local Heritage List along with the associated process for nomination, review and adoption is being finalised for publication on the Swale Borough Council website by mid-September. In tandem with the publication, a letter inviting nominations will be sent out to all the parish councils within Swale, all local amenity societies and any relevant public bodies.

Periwinkle Watermill (Milton Regis) Enhancement Project

The tendering documents (project drawings and work activity schedule) have been finalised and the draft contract to go in the tendering pack is expected to be finalised by the end of this week (w/c 22/08) latest, so that the tender can be placed on the bidding platform and the selected contractors can view the information and put together their bids, which will require a site visit. East Kent Engineering Partnership will be managing the tendering process on SBC's behalf, although the Borough Council's Conservation & Design Manager will be involved in the bid assessment process. Work is expected to commence in next week (w/c 29/08) on drawing up the text and images for the proposed interpretation signage at the site. It is anticipated that physical works will commence this autumn, although elements of the proposed landscaping scheme (i.e. the sowing of wildflower seed mix) may possibly need to wait until early Spring in 2023.

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Cover Report for Sittingbourne Area Committee Funding Scheme

Introduction

The Sittingbourne Area Committee has been allocated a total of £37,000.00 for the financial year 2022/23.

The process proposed by the Area Committee Review Working Group, and agreed by Area Committee Chairs, was to carry out a scoring process on applications received for Area Committee Funding. The deadline for applications was Monday 1 August 2022 and £77,027.30 of bids were received for consideration by the Committee. This means that there are £40,027.30 worth of bids in excess of allocation. All applications have been assessed for eligibility by officers and a scoring process carried out.

Three impartial officers have independently considered each application and given them a score against the criteria set out in the Applicant Guidance Notes. Each criteria were scored as follows High – 3, Adequate – 2, Limited – 1, None – 0. All three officers scores were added together and presented to Committee Members in Appendix 1. Also attached to this paper is the summary report on applications received which contain the full text provided by applicants describing projects/activities (Appendix 2). Committee Members were given the opportunity to challenge the scores and request a review. No challenges were received.

Proposal

Having considered the summary report and supporting papers, along with the scoring and background information, officers would like to submit 4 options for allocating funds for the Committee to vote on.

Part of the reason for the Working Group's recommendation that impartial officers should score bids based on criteria agreed in advance by Members was to create a degree of separation between the Committee's decision-making on the one hand and Members with a disclosable interest in a bidder (e.g. involvement with a community group or membership of a parish council) on the other. Members who have a disclosable non-pecuniary interest in any of the bids should declare it in the usual way and will be able to vote, as long as the voting is on the basis of the presented options, as this is unlikely to result in any Member having a bias. However, in the event that the Committee agrees to vote on amendments to these options, favouring (and by implication disfavouring) certain bids, Members with a disclosable non-pecuniary interest in the favoured bid(s) should not take part in the vote.

Option 1:

This option would allow the highest scoring applications to receive 100% funding from the scheme, however, the applicant with the lowest of these scores will receive slightly less to ensure that the annual allocation is not exceeded:

Details of project/activity:	<p>We would like to fund continued delivery of one-to-one support sessions for young people in Swale within their schools or alternative education settings that support them in remaining engaged with their formal education. Our sessions are tailored for each young person to help them maintain and improve their mental health and wellbeing so that they are able to make better decisions and choices that impact their behaviour. Our ultimate goal is to allow vulnerable and at-risk young people to maintain their places in school and not become excluded or moved onto alternative curriculum programs where they will be highly unlikely to achieve the true potential and this will then impact on their whole lives going forward. We work with young people that are struggling and often in a position of extreme risk regarding being involved in crime and anti-social behaviours. Our work allows these young people to better understand the impact of their decisions so they can make more informed choices. By achieving better academic engagement and gaining formal qualifications this will directly lessen the chances that these young people remain trapped in the cycle of deprivation that their families often face and also help them avoid entanglement with the criminal justice system at an early age.</p> <p>A large part of the work we do also involves linking these young people to the relevant services and advocating for them when they need additional support, for example when a young person clearly has mental health problems but cannot get accepted by their local CAMHS provider we can provide links to self-support and community groups that can assist whilst we help advocate for their need for clinical support. We have also been working with the KCC Talents and Interests programme and the Children In Need essential items programme to provide local gym memberships for young people to improve their physical and mental health.</p>

	<p>This grant would allow us to continue working in local schools with our very successful interventions until the end of this 2022/23 academic year providing vital opportunities to some of the most vulnerable and deprived young people across Swale. Our work meets Swale's Strategic Priority 3 as it looks to tackle inequalities for deprived young people by offering them support and interventions services to improve their physical and mental wellbeing using local activity and resource providers. By ensuring these youths remaining engaged in education we will enhance their opportunities to success in life and not become social disconnected or NEET, which can in turn increase the likelihood of anti-social behaviours.</p> <p>We pride ourselves on being an active part of the Swale voluntary sector and seek to work collaboratively with our sector colleagues and the local authorities to provide joined up support for all. We would like the area committees to consider jointly funding this initiative so that we can provide the support to young people in Swale regardless of their postcode, however if applications need to area specific we would look to apply for one third of the costs at each area and deliver for the benefit of those young people where we might be awarded funds.</p> <p>We have already been awarded funding from Awards for All and Children In Need to provide Mental Health First Aid training which we would offer to local schools for free as part of this support project. We will also be offering the opportunity for young people we have previously supported to undertake a volunteering role on this project to gain experience for the CV and YRUK will cover these expenses with the hopes that this may develop into an apprenticeship opportunity for the young people with our organisation.</p> <p><i>Additional information provided – Youth Resilience UK CIC advised they will be working with students at the Oasis Academy at both sites as well as Fulston Manor, The Sittingbourne School, Borden Grammar and Abbey School. They are more than willing to make additional links to new schools if any of the councillors feel that would be appropriate.</i></p>

Details of project/activity:	<p>Obviously, it is very upsetting for children to see one of their parents (or partners) abusing, attacking or controlling the other. Effects caused by this make the children disadvantaged in a number of ways.</p> <p>Younger children may become anxious. They may complain of tummy-aches or start to wet their bed. They may find it difficult to sleep, have temper tantrums and start to behave as if they are much younger than they are. They may also find it difficult to separate from their abused parent when they start nursery or school. Older children react differently. Boys seem to express their distress much more outwardly, for example by becoming aggressive and disobedient. Sometimes, they start to use violence to try and solve problems, and may copy the behaviour they see within the family.</p> <p>Older boys may play truant and start to use alcohol or drugs (both of which are a common way of trying to block out disturbing experiences and memories).</p> <p>Girls are more likely to keep their distress inside. They may become withdrawn from other people, and become anxious or depressed. They may think badly of themselves and complain of vague physical symptoms. They are more likely to have an eating disorder, or to harm themselves by taking overdoses or cutting themselves. They are also more likely to choose an abusive partner themselves. Children of any age can develop symptoms of what is called 'Post-traumatic Stress Disorder'. They may get nightmares, flashbacks, become very jumpy, and have headaches and physical pains.</p> <p>Children dealing with domestic violence and abuse often do badly at school. Their frightening experiences at home make it difficult to concentrate in school, and if they are worried about their abused parent, they may refuse to go to school. School holidays are a traumatic time for many families that we support – many of the children are now living in refuge just with Mum and their siblings and for others still residing in an abusive household spending more times indoors.</p> <p>Domestic violence affects the victims social wellbeing; Victims experience anxiety, depression, low self-esteem, inability to trust others, flashbacks, eating and sleeping disorders, and emotional detachment.</p> <p>Domestic violence affects a child socially; they may have temper tantrums and problems with school. They may behave</p>

as though they are much younger than they are. They may become aggressive or they may internalise their distress and withdraw from other people. They may have a lowered sense of self-worth.

New Leaf would propose to deliver a day of activities throughout the school holidays (11 days in total) in autumn half term, Christmas holidays, spring half term, summer half term x 2 weeks, summer holidays x 6 weeks.

The families / children we support do not have enough funds for holiday activities. More than two-thirds of survivors of domestic abuse have reported their partners withheld money from them as a key method of controlling and mistreating them. The activities will include fun sports days at a local park, family craft days, celebrating Christmas themes/decorations, Halloween fun and a free light lunch.

Priorities - the proposal supports:

- Undertake targeted interventions to identify our most disadvantaged families and communities, improve our understanding of the issues they face, and develop new ways of working to reduce social exclusion and enhance opportunities and quality of life. The activity days will be attended by NL support workers and volunteers. In addition to reducing social isolation / engaging with other families / making new friends / support network , try new activities/skills, have FUN, it will provide an opportunity for new victims of abuse to come along as a first means of engagement and receive information on how they can receive support from NL services. For many victims they may be nervous / anxious to approach our services directly through a formal referral / contact. By attending a fun activity day it will give them the opportunity to engage with our support workers as a first step in getting help from the issues they are facing and receive advice / support to address the issues they are currently facing and improve their quality of life for themselves and their children.
- Promote wellbeing and enjoyment of life by signposting and encouraging a wide range of sporting, cultural and other leisure activities appropriate and accessible to each age group. The activity days will give the victims and their children an opportunity to access a series of free leisure activities that will provide a safe space, new opportunities to try something they may not have experienced before and have FUN and enjoyment. There will be information available on these activity days for other local services / signposting.

The activity days will provide an opportunity for other local organisations to provide details of their own services and if

The platform will be specifically designed to increase social inclusion by providing accessibility for those with wider needs, enabling those in disabled buggies and wheelchairs to enjoy a ride on one of our heritage trains and visit our Kemsley Down site for the first time.
